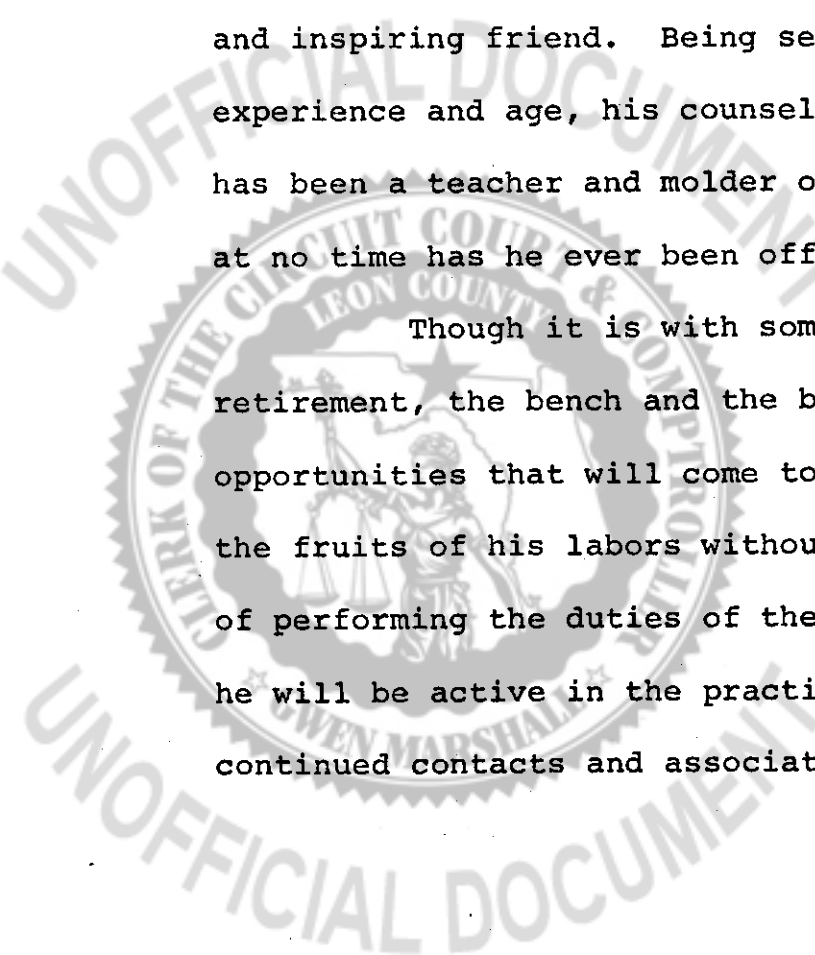
IN RE: RETIREMENT OF CIRCUIT JUDGE HUGH MOOR TAYLOR


